
Hockering will undoubtedly change over the next ten years. The plans for the dualling of the A47 past Hockering are currently (at the time of writing) under judicial review. It is the view of the Parish Council that this road improvement along with the proposed Western Link Road, will have a positive impact of the village. It will make the roads in and around Hockering safer and improve traffic flow out of the village in the mornings.

This will also make Hockering a more desirable place to live and the anticipation is that our village will expand in the next few years. One of our first working groups to be set up will be to develop a "Village Plan". This can be used to influence how

RE: Distribution of "The Light" ("TL") alongside the winter edition of Hockering Quarterly News ("HQN")

Response to Richard Hawker and Hockering Parish Council regarding the Editorial comments in HQN Spring 2023. Parish Councils are expected to remain politically neutral and serve all members of the community, regardless of their political affiliation or beliefs. Political bias undermines the trust and confidence that we as members of the community have in the Council.

TL is a right wing political publication that promotes extreme views and conspiracy theories based on unsubstantiated evidence. Whilst the views do not necessarily focus on promoting violence or hatred, what they do report is considered controversial and at times has included antisemitic sentiment.

The HQN is funded by the Parish Council and as such it is not unreasonable to expect it to also be bound by the requirement to remain politically neutral. I would expect a community led newsletter to maintain a strong sense of ethics and not to associate itself with the views of politically motivated magazines that for example promote that COVID19 was a hoax or include anti-Jewish racism.

It is understood that the Parish Council are not endorsing any of the articles published within the HQN. However, for example articles included in the Spring 2023 HQN discussing the "Norfolk Fuchsia and Pelargonium Society" or a letter from the children of Hockering Primary about tree planting would not be considered to be promoting political or controversial views. These articles are appropriate to the format of a village newsletter. The inference in the editorial comments that the views in TL are as harmless as any regular content you would expect to find in HQN is disturbing.

Whilst I appreciate Mr Hawker's apology for allowing the inclusion of TL to be distributed with HQN, he does make no apology for the political views being promoted. The general tone of his response is dismissive and is seemingly trying to normalise the views expressed within TL. Yes, an individual could simply throw the bundled copy of TL in the bin, but this is ignoring the point that it should never have been placed there in the first place. Mr Hawker's comments in this respect are condescending and show a general lack of acknowledgement that what has happened was unacceptable. In fact, the response goes as far as to attempt to legitimise and further promote the views published by TL. In doing so it is continuing a political bias and giving credence to far right views.

I ask that this letter is published as prominently as Mr Hawker's comments in the next HQN so as to provide a balance to the points that he has made.

We have an owner who is a resident of Hockering asking for some dog walking support but don't have enough local volunteers to help so wondered if you would be able to help us to promote the trust and our need for additional volunteers in the area, I have attached a poster and our press release to this email in the hope that you will be able to help.

A bit about the trust and what we offer as a free service to the over 65's and terminally ill of any age :-

The Cinnamon Trust is the national charity for the elderly and terminally ill and their pets. We seek to keep owner and pet together for as long as possible with the help of a national network of volunteers who offer free assistance when day to day care poses a problem, we are unique amongst charities as we aim to relieve to the owners of any worries about their pets welfare both during and after their own lifetime.

All volunteers help in the ways that are most appropriate to them. Teams take it in turn to visit housebound owners to take the dog for a walk, volunteers foster pets as one of their family when owners face a spell in hospital or respite care, they take pets to the vet, even clean out the budgie's cage or cats litter trays.

Pets can be registered with us so they will come into the trusts guardianship should the owner pass away or have to go into residential care, they are then rehomed with one of our long term foster volunteers and will live with them for life but the trust pays the vets fees and provides holiday cover and ongoing support.

We will be very grateful for any help you are able to offer.

HOCKERING *hainsaw* ARTIST MATT DARGE TAKES A CUT AT THE NORFOLK SHOW











Matt Darge from Hockering has taken the Royal Norfolk Show by storm this year with three huge sculptures created right here in his Hockering workshop.

The first of Matt's huge sculptures is a 2.5 ton, 11.5 feet tall wooden dragon sculpture that breaths smoke. This sculpture took hundreds of hours to create and was initially delivered by Mick Mason from the Hockering Garage to Norski Noos gallery and cafe in St George's Yard in Dereham. Andy Sullivan, gallery owner, said he was thrilled with how it looked outside the gallery. The Dragon briefly left Norski Noos after heading to the Royal Norfolk Show. It has now returned to the gallery and coffee shop along with a couple of friends.

The second piece on display is an eight-foot statue of the Star Wars character Din Djarin, the title character from the Disney+ hit, The Mandalorian. Whilst slightly smaller than it's Dragon companion it still weighs in at over 1.5 ton and is equally if not more impressive. Matt created this statue as he wanted to do something completely different to the usual wildlife commissions he is renowned for.

Matt said: "This has all been about proving I'm not a one-trick pony. "I'm always asked to do owls, hares, eagles and a lot of wildlife which I don't mind, I know I can do more, but never get commissioned to do so."

The third sculpture is an 11ft long garden bar with a Kraken carved into it - its tentacles taking the place of cup holders.

Other pieces that Matt has created include the Lady of the Wood at Holt Country Park. You can follow Matt on Facebook, YouTube and Instagram.

Matt is a long standing member of the Hockering community and has volunteered his time to help the village in many different roles, including being part of the Playing Field Association Committee and the Parish Council.




Photographers of Hockering

What does a priest look like? What springs to mind? Maybe it's the Hot Priest from Fleabag, or perhaps something older, black robes and stern expressions. Perhaps Father Ted.

It's a question that's been puzzling me, as ever since I started to wear this little bit of white plastic around my neck, I have had people tell me 'you're not what I expected'.

I can't speak for everyone in my profession, but I can tell you what this priest looks like. I generally look fairly innocuous. Looks can be somewhat deceiving.

People have a tendency to think that priests hatch out of giant eggs somewhere. Laid on a nest of pews, perhaps incubated by bishops in cool corners of churches. When we emerge, we are fed on a careful diet of weak tea and ginger biscuits until we are ready to wobble into the light. Maybe somewhere along the way they lost the recipe for the right concoction, and now are forced to recruit from among normal people.

Yes, indeed, I was once a normal person.

Not really. What is normal, anyway? In my late teens and early twenties I got an art degree and half-covered in tattoos. Then I spent a decade in the Royal Air Force. I was an armourer, worked on Harriers and then built bombs for a living. (If you're wondering, they're like IKEA furniture, they come in a box and you put them together with an Allen key)

Somewhere along the way I acquired a husband and some children (I'm joking, I know exactly where I picked him up, and I'm 90% sure where babies come from). That's when God decided to have a sense of humour and called me for ordination. My first, second and third reaction was to say no, not a chance. However, I gave in before, like Jonah, a whale was brought in to change my mind.

So that is how I ended up at theological college in my mid-thirties, with a surprise third baby. And a little later, that's how I ended up being the curate in the Mattishall and Tudd Valley benefice. Your curate. Your priest. I have three children, a geriatric dog and a sense of humour that gets worse as the day goes on.

So that's a bit of what this priest looks like. If it's not what you expect, well, that's probably good.

And if you ever need a cup of tea, I can be very easily persuaded to put the kettle on. I might even be able to find a biscuit.





Did you know that we have celebrities living here in Hockering? I had the pleasure of talking to Kevin and his husband Ed, famous in Norfolk as Miss Dee Licious and Mindy Pendant.

The Drag Queen duo have experienced huge success since launching their alter ego's during lock down, and have most recently featured in their own 6 page interview in Norfolk Magazine. Since launching Miss Dee Licious and Mindy Pendant to the world they have had a run of sell out events across Norfolk and it doesn't look to be slowing down any time soon.

Kevin said that Miss Delicious is "The Queen of the people with a voice for the People".

But their celebrity isn't just restricted to Norfolk. Kevin told me that he has won titles at Miss Charity Drag UK in both 2019 and 2020, he has been interviewed on BBC Look East News live, ITV Anglia, and Mustard TV. He has also been interviewed by PT Magazine and has been interviewed on Radio Norfolk no less that 8 times. On top of all that Kevin also has his own fitness DVD and is featured on the USA Powerhoop DVD. But, he was keen to stress that they both remain down to earth and true to themselves.

When Kevin isn't busy performing as his alter ego he volunteers his time as an ambassador for the LGBTQIA+ community and he was one of the founding organisers of the very first Dereham Does Pride held on 1st July at the Kings Head Hotel, Dereham.

Dereham Does Pride promotes 'Love is love'. The organisers of the inaugural event said that it was designed to focus on "connection, love, acceptance, support, family, appreciation, discussions and anything we can do to make you welcome and part of a community that will never give up on our rights to be who we are."

Miss Dee Licious and Mindy Pendant host bingo nights across Norfolk, bringing the LGBTQIA+ vibe to smaller communities, villages, and market towns. Their mission is to raise awareness of "queer life", it's challenges, and it's fights. They endeavour to educate their fans and clients about the importance of equality, self-love, and acceptance. All while providing a great and inclusive fun night out.

Kevin says that "the drag world and the queer scene are once again being challenged in many ways. That's why I decided to join the committee for the first Dereham Does Pride. I want to open a new local avenue and be a voice for younger queers. I want to give them the opportunity to stand up for their rights and be who they are without judgment.'

I have been co-ordinator for The Link, which is Mattishall Dementia Support Group, for around 18 months now, and, generally speaking, it runs pretty well, session on session, much the same as it did from its inception in 2018, with a few minor tweaks and changes.

We hold lots of information, have a thriving separate carers group, promote the use of individual playlists and memory boxes to help in those distressed times. We have quizzes, word searches, puzzles to do as well as singalongs and this suits our membership. Also, we had a very successful time at the coronation Fayre.

But what of other people with dementia, who don't find a group like ours useful?

I and other volunteers went recently to the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital to the first Dementia Fayre they had been able to organise since covid. One of the presentations was from Dirck Geary, an ex rugby player, who has early-onset dementia, and talked about his life - his golf, his driving, his decision-making. He shared that, along with Norfolk and Waveney Dementia Sup-port Services , he has set up a Support Group in North Norfolk for people recently diagnosed with dementia. As he said, such people have different needs which are not filled by a 6 piece puzzle! They need to talk , share ideas and solutions to problems of living with the brain disease dementia.

So what of recently diagnosed people in Mattishall? Or those with dementia that do not have carers? Where do they go, to lessen their worst fears about their maybe occasional symptoms and progressive diagnosis? I do not know. If you are recently diagnosed and would like to meet with others fairly locally, please get touch and I will do what I can to facilitate it.
